NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

Notice is hereby given pursuant to M.G.L. c. 30A, §2, that the Department of Public Health will hold a public hearing on proposed amendments to 105 CMR 700.000 related to the implementation of M.G.L. c. 94C (Controlled Substances Act). The Department is proposing to update the regulations to enhance the Massachusetts Prescription Monitoring Program (PMP) in order to fulfill the statutory mandates of Chapter 244 of the Acts of 2012 and improve public health and safety.

The hearing will be held on Friday, March 22, 2013, at 10:00 a.m. in the Public Health Council Room, Second Floor, Department of Public Health, 250 Washington Street, Boston, Massachusetts. <u>Describe the Scope and Objectives of the Regulation</u>: The objective of 105 CMR 700.000 is to implement the requirements of G.L. c. 94C (Controlled Substances Act). The sections being amended are related specifically to the Prescription Monitoring Program (PMP). The amendments fulfill the requirements of the legislation and require that certain health care providers utilize the PMP before seeing a new patient.

Business Industry(ies) Affected by the Regulation: Ambulatory Healthcare Services

Types of Businesses Included in the Industry(ies): Offices of Physicians, offices of dentists, offices of podiatrists

Total Number of Small Businesses Included in the Regulated Industry(ies) Please see the attached guidance documents for assistance determining the total number of small businesses: The types of businesses that will be most affected by this amendment are physician practices, dental practices, and podiatry practices. (Other health care providers write prescriptions, but do not have independent prescriptive authority.) According to the SBA web site, there are 24 medical practices listed as small businesses within the 621111 NAICS code, 6 dental practices in the 621210 code, and 1 podiatry practice in the 621391 code. However, it is likely that most of these kinds of practices do not self report as small businesses. According to the web site of the Board of Registration in Medicine, there are approximately 35,000 licensed physicians in MA, almost all of whom write prescriptions. According to the Board of Registration in Dentistry, there are approximately 7,000 licensed dentists in MA and presumably most of those write prescriptions. According to the Board of Registration in Podiatry, there are 554 licensed podiatrists in MA.

<u>Number of Small Businesses Potentially Subject to the Proposed Regulation</u>: Because so few ambulatory health care practices are registered as small businesses, the number of small businesses affected is difficult to calculate.
